Yuva Dasara 2025 took place from September 21st to October 2nd at Jayanagar 4th T Block, Bengaluru, spanning 12 vibrant days of cultural celebration. The event witnessed enthusiastic participation from over 25,000 attendees and featured 494 artists and resource persons across 60 cultural and sports competitions. With a social media reach of over 1 million (1,062,396) and engagement from 138 educational institutions, the festival successfully showcased Karnataka's youthful talent and creative spirit. Additionally, four workshops were conducted, further enriching participants with learning and collaboration opportunities. Yuva Dasara 2025 stood as a testament to the state's cultural diversity, artistic excellence, and the boundless energy of its youth.

Street Sambrama

The grand opening of Yuva Dasara 2025, Street Sambhrama, was a lively celebration of culture, community, and creativity. The Women Achievers segment celebrated the strength, resilience, and accomplishments of inspiring women who have made remarkable contributions to society. Their journeys stood as a testament to dedication and empowerment, reminding everyone that progress is built upon the vision and courage of women who lead with purpose and passion.



She co-edited Temple Treasures, documenting Karnataka's ritual objects, jewellery, and chariots with rare insights into form and symbolism. Recipient of the state's highest literary honor, the Daana Chintamani Attimabbe Award, she is the most recent woman writer to be recognized for life-time contributions to Kannada literature. Her work illuminates cultural heritage not just for scholars, but for generations to come.

Dr. Chudamani Nandagopal

Cultural Historian & Heritage Scholar

Dr. Chudamani Nandagopal is a leading cultural historian celebrated for her profound scholarship in dance, temple architecture, rituals, and performing arts of Karnataka. As Head of Academic Programs at IGNCA (Indian National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage), and Dean of Humanities at Jain University, she has been instrumental in bridging art, history, and lived traditions. Her PhD focused on "Dance and Other Fine Arts in Karnataka Architecture," reflecting her holistic approach to understanding art—through sculpture, ritual objects, and dance forms rooted in temple traditions.

Dr. B. Jayashree

Padma Shri-Awarded Theatre Icon & Cultural Leader

Dr. B. Jayashree is a marquee personality in Kannada theatre—an actor, director, singer, and creative dynamo. Granddaughter of Karnataka theatre legend Gubbi Veeranna, she graduated from NSD under the guidance of Ebrahim Alkazi, and went on to found Spandana Theatre in 1976—a trailblazing troupe known for blending folk traditions with modern narratives. Her work has earned her India's Sangeet Natak Akademi Award (1996), an honorary D.Litt (2009), and the civilian Padma Shri (2013). She also served as a Rajya Sabha MP, advocating for performing artists and women in the arts. Through her prolific body of work—spanning stage, film, playback singing, and mentorship—Dr. Jayashree continues to shape Karnataka's theatrical legacy.

Smt. Malathi Sharma

Sugama Sangeetha Exponent & Co-Founder, Adukalé

Smt. Malathi Sharma is a multifaceted achiever whose journey spans music, theatre, broadcasting, and entrepreneurship.

Trained under legends like Dr. R. K. Srikantan and Vidwan R. K. Suryanarayana, she blossomed into an A Top Grade artist of All India Radio and Doordarshan, performing Sugama Sangeetha on prestigious platforms across India and abroad. She has collaborated with icons such as Dr. C. Ashwath, Mysore

Ananthaswamy, and H. K. Narayana, and contributed to more than 50 albums, theatre productions, and films. As an actor, she worked with stalwarts like B. V. Karanth and M. S. Sathyu, breaking barriers for women in theatre.

Beyond the stage, Malathi Sharma co-foundedAdukalé, a successful culinary venture that has brought authentic Sankethi and Karnataka recipes to modern households through ready-to-eat products and spice blends. Adukalé is both a business and a cultural mission, preserving traditional tastes in a fast-paced world. Recipient of the **Karnataka Rajyotsava Award* and many other honors, she represents the perfect blend of artistry, innovation, and cultural preservation.

Dr. G. N. Sangeetha

First Visually Challenged Woman PhD in Karnataka

At age seven, Dr. G. N. Sangeetha lost her eyesight due to a brain tumor on the optic nerve. Supported by the National Association for the Blind (Karnataka), she pursued her education under the Integrated Scheme for the Blind and went on to achieve the *distinction of being the first visually impaired woman in Karnataka to earn a PhD. Her doctoral research focused on the empowerment of distressed women through organizations. She is a professor at NMKRV College, a counselor, activist, and inspiring speaker. In 2018, she delivered a TEDx Talk on providing smart ID cards for differently abled people. She has authored several impactful books, including Women's Organisations in Modern Era (2009), The Empowerment of Visually Impaired Women (2010), Economic Empowerment of Visually Impaired Women (2017), Hands Beyond Horizon (2018), and Hosa Mailigallannu Daatuthiruva Naariyaru (2020). Honoring her this Dasara is a recognition of her courage, scholarship, and relentless advocacy for disability and women's rights.

"I've faced many obstacles in my academic journey, but I never let my blindness define or limit me. It took immense strength and self-belief to keep going, and I hope my story reminds others that true courage lies in never giving up on yourself."





Known for her grounded approach and peoplecentric leadership, Saraswathi Ma'am represents the power of women administrators who drive inclusive development. Honoring her this Dasara is a tribute to a civil servant whose life is dedicated to social justice and grassroots impact

Smt. Saraswathi Nandan

KAS Officer & Social Welfare Leader

Smt. Saraswathi Nandan, a Karnataka Administrative Service (KAS) officer, has built her career on service and integrity. Hailing from Srirangapatna, she holds an M.A. in History and Kannada along with a B.Ed. After working as a lecturer, she joined KAS in 2009 and steadily rose through roles as Social Welfare Officer, Tribal Welfare Officer, Research Officer, and Deputy Secretary in Rural Development and Zilla Panchayat. She is now the **Joint Director of the Social Welfare Department*. Her work spans welfare of marginalized groups, tribal development, women's empowerment, cultural promotion, and temple administration.

Dr. Gali Madhavi Latha is a civil engineering professor at IISc and one of India's most respected geotechnical engineers. Her expertise in soil reinforcement, earthquake engineering, and slope stability has not only shaped academia but also national infrastructure. She played a pivotal role in the Chenab Bridge project, the world's tallest railway bridge, dedicating 17 years to overcoming geological challenges in Jammu & Kashmir. A PhD from IIT Madras, she now chairs the Centre for Sustainable Technologies at IISc, mentoring young researchers. Her humility and brilliance have earned her recognition as a true "unsung hero" of Indian engineering. Honoring her this Dasara is acknowledging women scientists who break barriers, contribute silently to nation-building, and inspire future engineers through perseverance and vision.

Bengaluru has always been my Karma Bhoomi, a city that shaped my journey and purpose. Working on the Chenab Bridge project was a challenging yet fulfilling experience, and I take pride in how it now connects Kashmir to the rest of India. She began as cleaning staff but soon became indispensable at the zoo hospital, hand-rearing cubs of tigers, lions, and leopards. She has nurtured nearly 80 cubs, feeding them milk, massaging them, and preparing them to survive in safari enclosures. Her bond is so strong that she often avoids seeing them after release, fearing emotional attachment. Her story shows that conservation is not only about science but also love, patience, and care. Honoring her this Dasara celebrates the invisible heroes who keep our natural heritage alive and proves that devotion and compassion can be as powerful as expertise.

"I've cared for many cubs at the National Park like they were my own children, and parting with them during relocation is never easy. I'm thankful to Yuvaka Sangha for acknowledging my love and dedication toward my work."

Competitions


Exposing the cultural talents




















Valedictory
